# Together for the First Time: Fall Hikers Workshop and Ecology Camp

In November 2007, High School Hikers (HSH) held Fall Hikers Workshop and Ecology Camp at Our Lady of Kea'au on the Leeward Coast. This was the first time that these two events were combined. In addition to hands-on activities and lessons in hiking, camping, tenting and basic survival skills, students had the opportunity to participate in a service project and hike.

Sunday's activities involved hands on learning of the cultural and environmental importance of the land we live on with a focus on the Wai'anae side of the island. The students were split into two groups with each spending half a day at The Learning Center of

Ka'ala (Ka'ala Farms) and the other half hiking to Ka'ena Point with a field lecture.

In Wai'anae Vallev. Ka'ala Farms perpetuated their motto, "If you plan for one hundred years, teach the children - aloha 'āina". During our time there, the students learned about the native and rare kauila tree with its dense and reddish wood, which was used to make spears, and were able to see a living example on a tour of the farm. To restore the natural environment, students pulled invasive grasses and hauled koa haole logs out of an area that they later planted 'ilima and 'ilie'e seedlings.

For Ka'ena Point, the students hiked from the



end of the paved road to the point. They met up with Ati Jeffers-Fabro, who pointed out the remnants of the rock wall built against the cliff for the passenger train railroad that once traveled where native plants and seabirds call home. Burrows were spotted along the trail with occasional views of wedgetailed shearwaters inside. Just outside one of the burrows, a fledgling rested in full view, unshaken to find itself the center of attention. We also saw the 'akoko and 'ohai plants, and before heading back to camp, a monk seal resting on the lava rocks. A fun and educational time was had by all!






#### MOANALUA HIGH SCHOOL RETURNS TO MOLOKA'I

## BAKED EGG CASSEROLE RECIPE FROM THE KITCHEN OF CHEF NYLEN TAKAHASHI

For those of you who go camping with large groups and find it difficult to cook eggs, most times scrambled, you might consider using this recipe (if you have an oven available). It allows you to prepare the eggs in advance and thus focus your energies to other tasks (like frying bacon).

#### What you need:

An oven Tin Pan

#### Ingredients:

2 eggs per person 1 can condensed milk per dozen eggs Salt & pepper Optional ingredients:
Chopped onions (round or green)
Chopped mushrooms (fresh or canned, but squeezed dry)
Bacon bits (packaged is fine)

Grated cheese

#### Directions:

Crack one dozen eggs into an aluminum pan. Mix in 1/2 can condensed milk, 1 t salt, 1 t pepper.

At this point, you can bake the eggs and it will be fine. However, I like to add other stuff. If you want to add the optional ingredients (onions, mushrooms, bacon, cheese), now is the time to do it.

If you want to experiment, you can omit or substitute similar ingredients. For instance, chopped spam in place of bacon or use both.

Bake egg mixture in a 325 degree oven or until center is set. Garnish with cheese and green onions (optional).

It is also possible to cook this over an open fire. However, greater attention is necessary. If you are so daring, seal the pan with foil and use indirect heat

(rotating the pan as necessary so that the eggs don't overcook and burn).

In February 2008, HSH students had the opportunity to participate in a fun weekend camp up on the North Shore. At Camp Paumalu, students learned how to make bamboo nose flutes and 'opihi shell necklaces, create leaf print T-shirts, dance a hula, and identify the flora around the campsite.
